What is this course about? This course takes a mixed methods social science approach to analyzing the phenomenon of spiritual power and spiritual abuse in religious communities. In this course we will rely on theories offered by Luckmann, Peter Berger, and other prominent social scientists to analyze both spiritual power and the abuse of that power in religious communities. This course will also rely on historic accounts from the Caribbean and Colonialism, as well as modern accounts from local, national, and international sources to help better understand the phenomenon. Our fundamental aim will be to better understand the connection between the symbolic spiritual power held by individuals and how that power is used to abuse others.

# **I. How will you succeed in this course?**

### 1. Read the assigned readings from academic sources throughout the semester!

These will serve as a theoretical and practical foundation for understanding both spiritual

power and spiritual abuse.

## II. Course Objectives, Plagiarism Statement, Academic freedom statement

As a course, students will be meet the following objectives through text readings, assignments, and class discussions:

1. Students will be able to analyze topics such as power, abuse, religious communities, and religious governance of communities from multiple academic perspectives.

2. Students will be able to assess how global issues and trends are interrelated with the development and practice of religions specifically in the space of spiritual power and abuse.

3. Students will be able to demonstrate willingness to think and respond creatively and compassionately about religious issues in the contemporary world.

4. Students will be able to articulate a working definition of spiritual power and spiritual abuse informed by data, theory, and history.

#### **Statement on Plagiarism**

# **IV. Assessment Descriptions**

## A. Final Essay

**The essay must have a thesis, and adequately support that thesis using data. The essays must be organized clearly and logically.** Each paper will be 1,000-1,200 words and will be submitted through Turnitin. All source material must be cited correctly using Chicago style formatting. Please be aware that papers with an originality score of over 35% similarity will be subject to additional scrutiny and may incur additional penalties, up to and including receiving an F (0 points). Please do NOT send any writing assignments as email or message attachments! All writing assignments must be submitted in the proper drop box in Canvas; there are no exceptions. Late papers may be accepted with a legitimate excuse and the maximum score will be 75%.

## **B. In-class Group Discussions/Presentation**

The bulk of the coursework will be done within the course in one of two forms. The first of which are in-class group discussions based on prominent texts or publications relating to the subject matter. The second of which are reflections based on interviews which will be done in class.

- 1. In Class Group Discussion: Each group will be assigned a source material: An academic publication or a publication disclosing or discussing spiritual abuse. The groups will each take 10 minutes presenting their assigned material and then 10 minutes discussing their material with other groups.
- 2. Book Presentation: Each group will be assigned one book to present in class that addresses the subject matter. The group will present the book, and then the class will discuss and engage with the material.

## C. Written Reflection

Throughout the class, we will have the privilege of hearing from individuals working to combat and overcome the phenomenon of Spiritual Abuse. In response to these guests, each student will write a 300-word reflection on canvas. Students will then respond to two posts from their peers with 75-word responses.

### **D.** Participation/Attendance

Your attendance will be monitored and makes up 15% of the final grade of the course. If you are not in class (physically or virtually depending on circumstance), your grade will be affected. You will also be lacking critical information to complete the assignments.

Everyone gets 3 days they can miss. Do not abuse them.

Attendance will be calculated at the end of the semester, if I calculate it before hand it will not calculate correctly.

### F. Extra Credit Opportunities

Extra credit can account for up to 5% of your final grade. You get one opportunity to do this.

**1.** Proof that you went to the writing center. You must go and have them help you write one of your essays. You automatically get 5% for doing this. Make the appointment early and show up. Do not email me proof of this. Upload it on canvas.

2. Participate and complete the ICF coaching. You will get credit for this upon completion of 6 sessions, and filling out the perceptions survey at the end.
