STUDIES IN WORLD RELIGIONS

OVERVIEW:

This class will explore many religious traditions practiced throughout the world. By paying constant attention to their similarities and differences, it is hoped that this course will acquire a large-scale picture of global religious diversity. We will examine the practices of major and minor world religions – from Native American and African traditions, through Hinduism, Jainism, Buddhism, and East Asian religions, and finally the three Abrahamic religions: Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. We will discuss the historical contexts of their emergence and spread, the points of contact and dialogue with each other, the nuances of their belief systems and institutions, and their individual contributions to world civilization. This course will also place a great emphasis on discussion of primary texts.

AIMS:

- 1. To provide the student with a large amount of details and information on the beliefs, rituals, symbols, and scriptures of major world religions.
- 2. To facilitate cross-cultural comparisons of religious faith and practice.
- 3. To broaden the intellectual and spiritual horizons of the student by exposure to the beauty, vitality, truth, and power of religious approaches to reality, especially within non-Western frameworks.
- 4. To challenge the student to enter sympathetically into the worldviews of the religious traditions selected for study.
- 5. To prepare the student for informed, ethical participation in our religiously plural world.

Weekly Discussion Responses (20%):

Every Thursday afternoon, I will post a passage on the discussion board, usually a primary text from a religious tradition. I may also post a few guiding questions. By class time the following Thursday, you must a short response to the original posting on the discussion board, summarizing your thoughts on the text and what it is meant to communicate.

Thursday online quizzes (20%):

Every Thursday afternoon I will post a short online quiz on the week's material. The quiz will comprise of simple multiple-choice and matching questions and should take less than ten minutes to complete. The quiz must be completed by the following Thursday.

Midterm (15%) and Final (15%):

These exams will consist of both objective and essay portions. The objective portions of the midterm and final are both online, time-restricted examinations. **Students will have only one attempt to complete the both portions of these exams.** The essay prompts for the exams will become available in the "Quizzes" area during the exam availability period. The essay portions of these exams must be submitted via Canvas.

The Midterm Objective portion will cover Indigenous religions, Hinduism, Jainism, and Buddhism.

The Final Objective portion will cover Daoism/Confucianism, Shinto, Judaism, Islam, Christianity, and New Religions

Religious Site Report (15%):

At any time prior to Week 12 of the semester, students will observe a religious ritual in a religious site of their choice, preferably a local one. The student will then complete two assignments based on this visit.

- 1. **Site Visit Report**: Guidelines for this 3-4 page report will be posted on Canvas.
- 2. **Site Visit Presentation**: Students will execute an extremely short (<5 minutes) presentation of visit.
