Course Description

Why should we care about religion?

Sociologist Emile Durkheim saw religion as a part of the human condition, and while the content of religion might be different from society to society over time, religion will, in some form or another, always be a part of social life. Therefore, you do not need to be a religious person in order to be in contact with religion.

Why do bad things happen to good people? Is religion irrelevant in our fast-paced technological world? Does the sacred look the same across traditions? How can the study of religion help us understand current events? Is religion a creative or destructive force? How does the study of religion relate to your major? These are just some of the questions that we will explore throughout the semester.

This course introduces methods of critical reflection on religion and some of their applications to fundamental topics such as knowledge, value, the sacred, the individual, and the human society, starting with the classical Western canon up until the contemporary world. Written work meets the state composition requirement.

How a Hybrid Course Works

In a hybrid course, class time is divided evenly between in-person sessions and independent work outside the classroom.

- **In-person (50%):** We will meet regularly to apply what you've learned through discussions, group work, debates, and activities that deepen your understanding of key concepts. This course uses a *flipped classroom* approach, meaning that most in-class time will be dedicated to your active participation, while I will guide, support, and clarify questions.
- **Independent work (50%):** Outside of class, you are responsible for preparing for our sessions. This includes reading the textbook, engaging with assigned articles and videos, writing papers, posting on the discussion board, and completing other assignments. This preparation ensures that you come to class ready to contribute and build on your knowledge.

Expectations of this Course

Hybrid Course Expectations

This is a hybrid course, which means half of the coursework takes place online

and half during our in-person meetings. Expectations for your performance are the same as in a traditional course. In fact, hybrid courses often require **more self-motivation, self-discipline, and comfort with technology**, which can make them more demanding for some students.

Assignments & Assessments

Assignments

1. Opinion Paper: *Globalization and Religion*

- **Prompt:** Is globalization good for religion or not?
 - **Requirements:** Research a case study on globalization and religion using AI tools. Present arguments both for and against the impact of globalization, then state your opinion.
 - **Support:** The assignment will be broken down into five (5) different parts with detailed guidance available in the **Modules** section on Canvas.
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2. Reflection Essay: *Experiencing Religion Around Me* (1000–1500 words)

- **Journal:** Keep a journal for 5 days, documenting how religion appears in your everyday life. Submit the journal for feedback before writing the essay.

- **Essay:** Write a reflection paper analyzing your journal observations.
 - **Details:** Instructions and requirements are provided in the **Modules** section on Canvas.
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3. Online Reflections (Discussions)

- **Before class:** Read the assigned material, post your response to the weekly prompt, and reply to at least one peer.
 - **Deadlines:**
 - Initial post due **Friday night**
 - Peer response due by **Sunday night** (final deadline)
 - **Grading notes:**
 - No response to a peer = automatic **-7 points**
 - No initial post = **zero**
 - Late or make-up posts are **not allowed**
 - **Reminder:** Posts are visible to your classmates, and some may be discussed in class. Write thoughtfully and respectfully.
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4. Group Project: *Create Your Own Religion*

- Work in groups to design a religion, applying concepts from class.
 - **Collaboration:** In-class work + group Collaboration tool in Canvas. Progress must be posted online regularly for feedback.
 - **Final presentation:** Each group will present their religion during the last weeks of the semester.
 - **Rubric & instructions:** Available in the **Modules** section on Canvas.
 - **Final grade:** It will be a mix of individual grades and group grades, so it may be that some students in the same group end up with different final grades in the project (see rubric)
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5. In-Class Activities

- Periodic assignments will be completed and submitted during class.

- **Policy:** Students not present will receive a **zero** unless the absence is excused (see attendance policy).
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6. Exit Tickets

- At the end of some in-person classes, you will complete a short activity or question related to the day's lesson.
 - **Policy:** Students not present will receive a **zero** unless the absence is excused (see attendance policy).
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Assessments

1. Quizzes (6 total)- Lowest score to be dropped at the end of the semester

- **Format:** 10 questions each
 - **Policy:** Lowest quiz score dropped

- **Format:** Multiple-choice and true/false
- **Time:** 70 minutes
