Course Description

Why should I care about religion?

Why do bad things happen to good people? Is religion irrelevant in our fast-paced technological world? Does the sacred look the same across traditions? How can the study of religion help us understand current events? Is religion a creative or destructive force? How does the study of religion relate to your major? These are just some of the questions that we will explore throughout the semester.

This course will offer an explorative introduction to the basic's concepts of religion, and how we should study it. We will examine how interdisciplinary thinkers have analyzed religions around the world. We will examine the different expressions of religion, such as sacred space and time, myth, rituals, rites, scriptures and our human views of good and evil. This course introduces methods of critical reflection on religion and some of their applications to fundamental topics such as knowledge, value, the sacred, the individual, and the human society, starting with the classical Western canon up until the contemporary word. Written work meets the state composition requirement.

- Recognize the universal forms of religious experience and expression,

including sacred symbols, rituals, myths, scriptures, ethical systems, and religious communities.

- Explain and evaluate different approaches, theories, and methodologies used in the academic study of religion
- Apply key concepts from religious studies to analyze the role of religion in shaping individuals, cultures, societies, and contemporary issues.
- 1. Analyze religious beliefs, practices, and issues from multiple cultural, historical, and disciplinary perspectives.

Course Goals

The aim of this course is to understand the many facets of the religions of the world and also to be able to formulate our own questions and apply different mythologies. By the end of the semester students will be able to:

-Explain the basic history, development and belief systems of various religious traditions.

-Recognize differences and similarities found in different cultures.

- Identify the meaning behind religious concepts and symbols.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the evolution and movement of religious beliefs from the past to contemporary times.
- Demonstrate an increased empathetic awareness of religious diversity and differences.
- Analyze topics in the fields of religious studies from multiple perspectives.

Expectations of the Course

This is a traditional in-person course, which means most of the course work, especially instructions and some assignments will be conducted in classroom setting. Expectations for performance in this class is the same for all traditional courses. Students are, however, required to master a degree of self-motivation, self-discipline, and technology skills which to access some course resources as well as be able to communicate effectively through canvas.

Students are expected to:

- Review course syllabus to familiarize yourself with course content.
- Read and review course materials assigned to each topic before coming to class.
- Acquire required reader (textbook) by the end of first week of class.
- Be punctual in class and participate in class discussions. Students who arrive **more than 15 minutes late** will receive **80% of the attendance/ participation credit for that class session**.
- Log in to the course canvas regularly for any announcements
- Refrain from using phones during class. Phones should be silenced and

kept out of sight unless instructed otherwise.

- Respond to emails within 24hour.
- Submit assignments by the corresponding deadline

In-Class Assignments

Throughout the semester, students will complete a variety of in-class assignments related to the course material. These activities may include reflections, discussions, interviews, quizzes, group work, short writing exercises, or other classroom activities designed to reinforce key concepts and support preparation for major assignments and exams.

In-class assignments must be completed during the scheduled class session and require the student's physical presence in class. Students who are absent, arrive late, leave early, or do not complete the assignment during class may receive reduced credit or no credit for that activity unless the absence is documented and excused in accordance with University policy.

Reflection Essays : 750 words

You will complete three reflection essays based on assigned chapters. These short assignments are designed to help you engage with course concepts, develop your ideas, and practice analytical writing.

Each reflection should:

- Go beyond summary and include your own analysis
- Use course concepts and examples
- Include citations from the textbook

Final Paper: “Create your own Religion”

For the final assignment, you will design your own religion using the concepts studied throughout the semester. This paper should demonstrate your ability to apply course theories and ideas to create a coherent and meaningful belief system.

This is not just a creative assignment—your religion must be grounded in academic concepts from the course.

Your paper should include:

- A clear description of your religion’s **beliefs and worldview**
- Explanation of key elements, including:
 - The sacred (sacred vs. profane)
 - Rituals and religious practices
 - Symbols, myths, or narratives
 - Sacred texts or teachings
 - Structure of community (church, sect, or movement)
 - Ethical system (right vs. wrong)

****Students may not submit work from a previous semester or from another class for this assignment or any other assignment in this course.**

Assignment Details and Instructions:

- Format: MLA Format Required
- Content: Field research and supplementary research
- Length: 1800-2000 Words, Not Including Your Works Cited Page
- Double –Spaced, 12-Pt Font, Arial Or Times New Roman Font
- Sources: Minimum 6 MLA in-text citations
- Works Cited Page required
- In addition to the paper, you will prepare a short presentation summarizing your ideas.
- **Presentation Requirements**
 - **Length:** 3 minutes
 - **Slides:** 5 slides maximum

Midterm Exam

- **Coverage:** First half of the semester
- **Format:** 25 multiple-choice and true/false questions, 1 short essay question
- **Time:** 75 minutes

Final Exam

- **Coverage:** Second half of the semester
- **Format:** 25 multiple-choice and true/false questions, 2 short essay question
- **Time:** 120 minutes

- **Handwritten Notes Requirement:**

Handwritten class notes will be collected at the midterm and final exams and are part of your course grade (15 points). Notes should reflect consistent engagement with lectures and course material. Random, minimal, or incomplete notes may not receive full credit.
