Course Description

This course surveys how major social and political theorists in the Western canon have interpreted religious life and its role in human societies. Using *Beyond Nature and Culture* by Philippe Descola as a guide, students will learn to identify how different cultural systems categorize the relationship between humans and the world and apply these models to both canonical theories and diverse religious traditions. Students will explore early thinkers and theorists who have set the framework and diverse explanations of religion as moral foundation, political authority, ideological illusion, or source of meaning.

By combining traditional readings with multimedia sources—including documentaries, lectures, and films—this course ensures that students approach complex theories through multiple modes of learning.

The utility of this course lies in the transferable skills it fosters:

- **Critical analysis** of major theoretical traditions in Western thought
- **Comparative perspective** on religion across cultures
- **Media literacy**, through engaging scholarly and popular interpretations of religion

- **Applied research skills**, via field observation and ethnographic reflection
- **Communication skills**, developed through group presentations and a final research project

Ultimately, this course equips students with tools to understand religion not only as a subject of belief but as a central category in the organization of human societies, politics, and worldviews.

Expectations of this Course

This is a hybrid course, meaning half of the coursework will be conducted in class, on campus, with the remaining half conducted out of class, including in this Canvas course. Expectations for performance in hybrid courses are the same as in a traditional course. Hybrid courses require a degree of self-motivation, self-discipline, and technology skills which can make these courses more demanding for some students.

Students are expected to:

Criteria for Assessments

Thought further details are available in each tab, here is a reference of what you will be graded on for each assignment or assessment

1. Weekly Reflections (20%)

Criteria: Clarity of writing, engagement with Descola, integration of media/canonical theory, original insight.

2. Midterm Essay (15%)

Criteria: Thesis clarity, comparative analysis, integration of Descola + media

sources, organization and style.

3. Group Presentation with Media (15%)

Criteria: Content accuracy, creative use of media, integration of Descola + theorists, delivery and collaboration.

4. Field Observation / Ethnography (15%)

Criteria: Quality of observation, application of comparative framework, integration of concepts, writing style.

5. Final Comparative Paper (20%)

Criteria: Depth of analysis, integration of Descola + canonical theories, originality and argument strength, mechanics and citations.

6. Attendance and Participation (15%)

Criteria: Attendance to all classes (one unexcused absence allowed) and active participation (leading a discussion or topic for example) in at least every other class.
