Why Should we Care about Religion?

Sociologist Emile Durkheim saw religion as a part of the human condition, and while the content of religion might be different from society to society over time, religion will, in some form or another, always be a part of social life. Therefore, you do not need to be a religious person in order to be in contact with religion. This course will provide you the tools to learn and understand different religious beliefs from around the world and how they interact with your academic field.

Maybe Jesus was a Buddhist monk. Where exactly did your yoga class come from? Why are Native Americans some of the best eco-advocates today? Is Judaism a religion, a culture, or a tribe? It might be good to wonder if religion is a force for good or evil to begin with. Can we still be spiritual without being religious? These are not just entertaining questions but are highly relevant to your personal and professional development in our globalized world. In this interdisciplinary course, we will explore these questions and many more that emerge as we investigate humanity, religion, and the cosmos.

This is an introductory course to world religions and one of the many courses that complete the Global Learning requirement. Since it is an extensive subject, we will be focusing on some of the major religions of our world, examining them from its historical, sociological, anthropological, psychological, and ritualistic practices. Furthermore, we will also learn about religions that are no longer in practice and had influenced some of today's religions. We will analyze the differences and similarities between religions and associate their practices, beliefs, and applications to contemporary issues in our world.

What are the Course Objectives?

Upon completing this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate an understanding of themes, definitions, and symbols relating to religion.
- Compare and contrast the key underlying beliefs and principles of the major Eastern, Western, indigenous and shamanic religions.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the evolution and movement of religious beliefs from ancient to contemporary times.
- Evaluate religious truth claims as potential sources of knowledge.
- Demonstrate an increased empathetic awareness of religious diversity and differences.

What is important to learn as a global citizen? What are the University Requirements for the Global Learning Objectives?

1. **Global Awareness:** Students will be able to demonstrate knowledge of the inter-relatedness of local, global, international, and intercultural issues, trends, and systems. **Course Learning Outcome:** Students will demonstrate knowledge of the interrelated dynamics (social-cultural, political, economic, etc.) that shape the actions of multiple figures in diverse cultural contexts.
2. **Global Perspectives:** Students will be able to develop a multi-perspective analysis of local, global, international, and intercultural problems. **Course Learning Outcome:** Students will be able to analyze the multiple causal forces that shape the perspectives of historical individuals/persons — economic, political, sociological, technological, cultural, etc.

3. **Global Engagement:** Students will be able to demonstrate a willingness to engage in local, global, international, and intercultural problem solving. **Course Learning Outcome:** Students will demonstrate a willingness to engage in negotiation regarding actions of global import within the context of the class simulation.

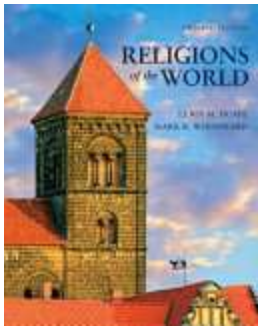

What are the Expectations of This Course?

This is a hybrid course which means that 50% of the time dedicated to the course is in person, engaging in learning, clarifying concepts, debating, working in groups, and discussing and developing each of the concepts covered in the course. This course is taught in “reversed classroom” style, in which most of the work in class is done by students, and I will be there to clarify your questions and guide you in your work. This course is taught in a remote synchronous mode, meaning we will be meeting via Zoom once a week.

The other 50% of the time takes place outside the class, and it will be your responsibility to acquire all the knowledge required for the activities in class. This includes reading the textbook, writing papers, watching videos, reading articles, providing opinions on different topics, and posting weekly in a discussion board. My responsibility is to provide you with material and activities for you to apply and put into practice the concepts learned in the readings, as well as clarify all the questions that may arise from them. Your responsibility is to read the textbook and complete all assignments in a timely manner. This will enable us using the time in class to actively apply the concepts.

Students are expected to:

- **review the getting started page** located in the course modules;
- **introduce yourself to the class** during the first week by posting a self-introduction in the appropriate discussion;
- **take the practice quiz** to ensure that your computer is compatible with the learning management system, Canvas;
- **interact** online and in-person with instructor and peers;
- **interact** with your COIL partners in Brazil
- **review** and follow the course calendar and weekly outlines;
- **log in** to the course at least **4 times** per week;
- **respond** to discussions by the due date specified. **No late work will be accepted;**
- **respond** to **emails** within **1-2 days;**
- **submit** assignments by the corresponding deadline

I, as your instructor will:

- log in to the course **5-6 times** week;
- respond to discussion postings within **2 days of the deadline**;
- respond to **emails** within **24 hours**, unless it is on the weekend or a holiday
- grade assignments within **2 days** of the assignment deadline.
- grade essays within **10 days** of the assignment deadline

Late Assignment policy

- Late assignments are accepted for online activities with a 20 point penalty per late day.
- Late essays are accepted with a 2 point penalty per late day, up to 16 points. No essays will be accepted beyond Week 13 of the semester
- No late submissions of online discussions are accepted

How will you and I communicate?

Communication in this course will take place via the Canvas Inbox or by emailing me directly at vschindl@fiu.edu. Check out the [Canvas Conversations Tutorial](#) or [Canvas Guide](#) to learn how to communicate with your instructor and peers using Announcements, Discussions, and the Inbox. I will respond to all correspondences within 24 hours.

How will you and I evaluate your progress?

- **Ten 10-questions quizzes** – from which the lowest score will be dropped at the end of the semester. The quizzes will be available for four (4) days in Canvas, opening on Thursday and closing at the end of the day on Sunday. Students will have 10 minutes to complete each quiz. You will have the chance to take each quiz twice if you want, and the highest score will be kept as your final score.
- **Midterm and Final Exams.**
 - **Midterm:** will cover the first half of the semester and will include 50 multiple choice and true and false questions. Students will have one hour and ten minutes to complete it. The midterm will be available for four (4) days in Canvas, opening on Thursday and closing at the end of the day on Sunday.

- **Final:** will cover from second half of the semester and will include multiple choice, and true and false questions. Students will have one hour and ten minutes to complete it. The final will be available for four days around the date set by the university. You can consult Panthersoft later on in the semester for the day.

Research Paper

Students will have to choose two different religions, and research, compare, and contrast one element that appears in both religions. You will have to use scholarly sources for this assignment, no websites or Wikipedia articles will be accepted. The topic needs to be approved by the deadline indicated in Canvas by the professor, if not, you will not receive a grade for the essay. Some time in class will be allocated to teach you how to perform research in the library. Details on the content and format of the essay are provided in Canvas in the module for Course Resources

- **The essay has two components:**
 - **Bibliography and draft:** Should be 1000-1500 words and it is 30% of the final grade of the essay for details click on [Draft and Bibliography](#)
 - **Final essay:** 1200-2000 words for details click on [Research Paper](#)

Online activities

- Every week after covering a topic, you will have to submit one or two activities. Each activity is available in the corresponding module and is due at midnight Sunday, after the link will no longer be available. All the due dates are listed on the course's calendar. Points will be deducted for poor grammar or typos, and not well justified answers. *There is a late policy for this assignment: the grade will be dropped by 20 points per late day.*

Group Project

Group Project: The Hero's journey, a graphic novel. This project will take place during the semester. You will be working in groups to develop a Graphic novel in which you will create a story centered around a hero in specific time on a specific religion of India. You will develop the project in class but might have to finish outside class. Detailed information is provided in Canvas

Perusall Reflection

Before covering each topic in class, you will have to read the textbook. Perusall is a social tool in which students can highlight things and make comments, ask questions, or address questions that other students have. You will have to make at least 6 comments. I will provide you with some general prompts that you can address, or you can choose to make your own comments. This assignment is due on Sunday. Keep in mind that your discussion forum postings will likely be seen by other members of the course and I might bring some of your posts to be discussed in class. Care should be taken when determining what to post. *Since these are intended to be online "discussions" (similar to conversations), late submissions or make ups will not be allowed under any circumstances.*

Attendance and participation

Attendance to In-Person meetings is mandatory, and students are expected to engage in class discussion. Missing more than 2 classes (unexcused absences) in the semester will result in a zero grade for attendance and participation. Arriving late or leaving early, or stepping out of the class for long periods of time may incur an absence penalty. Excused absences are those related to religious holidays or illness (for the last one you need to show proper documentation). Participation includes reading for class, contributing to discussions, being attentive to lectures and student presentations, and completing an exit ticket activity by the end of the day in which we meet. Participation also includes introducing yourself in the online forum

- **Exit Ticket:** Each student will have a chance until 3pm on the day we have in-person class to fill out an exit ticket, which is going to be something related to what happened during the Zoom meeting. It could either be a few multiple choice questions, one open ended question, or if we do a Kahoot at the end of the class and you participate you will get all points. This should not take more than a couple of minutes to do. I highly encourage you to fulfill this as soon as class is over. **The exit ticket is worth 5% of the grade for attendance and participation**

Zoom Video Conference

Zoom is a video conference tool that you can use to interact with your professor and fellow students by sharing screens, chatting, broadcasting live video/audio, and taking part in other interactive online activities. We will be utilizing this tool to conduct meetings with the professor or to collaborate with your classmates or COIL partners in Brazil.

Zoom meetings can be accessed via the Zoom link in the course navigation menu. Once you click on the Zoom link, it will route you to join the meeting for the respective class session. You will also be able to view upcoming meetings, previous meetings that you have already joined, and meeting recordings. Before joining an actual class session:

How will you succeed in this course?

- Attending and participating in class:** Be ready to be an active learner and participate in class discussions and activities. In order to maximize your learning experience, I ask you that you refrain from using your phone in class or using your computer for other things than taking notes. We will sometimes use the computer or phone for activities, so have them handy. Late arrivals will count as 0.25 if you are 10 minutes late or 0.5 if you are 10 to 15 minutes late. More than 15 minutes late will be counted as a full absence.

- **Complete the assigned reading and online reflection before coming to class:** If you know the material, you will be able to actively participate in class. I might also bring your online reflection post to class to talk about it.
- **Check Canvas at least 4 times a week.** I will be monitoring your participation. To log into Canvas go to canvas.fiu.edu and use your Panthersoft credentials.
- **Submit essays on time.** There will be 2 points taken off your final grade for the essay per late day, up to 16 points total. If students don't submit the essay by the latest for submission date marked on the calendar, the essay won't be graded and students will receive a zero grade.
- **Submit online activities on time**
- **Take Quizzes and tests on time:** I understand things happen, so if you let me know in advanced you won't be able to take a quiz, I will re-schedule it for you. However, there will be no make-up dates for the final exam. Dates for midterm and final exam are listed in Canvas.
- **Extra Credit.** Sometimes some students may need an extra help, and it usually involves attending a special lecture and writing a summary and analysis. The essay could be worth up to 3 extra credit points to be added to the final grade. You will have to write a one-page summary of the lecture for one extra credit point. If you want, you can write a two-page analysis linking the lecture to the content of the class for up to two more points. Reports need to be well written with good grammar. A maximum of 6 extra credit points could be awarded. Please refer to the list of events provided in the Course Resources module.
